29th Sunday Ordinary Time, October 21, 2018

"Can you drink the cup that I must drink?" It is the question Jesus puts to his disciples in this weekend's gospel. The argument the disciples engaged in along the road concerned who should have the places of honour in the messianic kingdom. But places of honour were not part of the thinking of the Lord. "Anyone who wants to be first among you must be servant, a slave to all."

During our Plenary Council reflections a couple of Sundays ago we were reminded that Jesus' plan about discipleship in his community lasted about 300 years. In 313 Constantine had become Emperor of the Roman Empire and he issued his famous Edict of Milan allowing Christianity an equal footing with the other religions of Rome throughout the Empire. The time of persecutions was now over. The "cup" no longer was drained. The Chair of the Emperor gradually changed places with the Chair of Peter. Although there have been many servant Popes and Bishops over the centuries it seemed that the trappings of glory and power was enjoyed by far too many Popes and Cardinals and Bishops in all these centuries since Constantine. So "clericalism" with its connotations of pedestals and prestige and power has become a term of derision in a post Vatican II, post Royal Commission church. Hopefully it marks the beginning of a return to the kind of church that Jesus dreamed about.

On Wednesday evening this coming week I shall be helping the Year 12 ladies at Kilbreda celebrate their Graduation Mass at the Caulfield Race course. No doubt the course will be quiet after the razzmatazz of the Caulfield Cup meeting. But the hearts of those young women will be racing as thirteen years of schooling comes to an end, and a largely unknown future lies ahead. "What shall I do with my life?" A human life lies ahead for them, and hopefully for many, a Christian life of service too.

The Synod on Youth in Rome this week concentrated on the ambivalent term of "vocation." The working document drawn up for the Bishops emphasised personal accompaniment of the young in helping them decide on their future. But a French speaking group quickly emphasised community accompaniment — families, parishes, youth groups, schools, universities, and so on. May all our Year 12's graduating at this time find the vocation they seek that will give meaning to them for the rest of their lives.

REVISITING MISSION 2017:

A Church for Mission

What do people find when they come to a local church? Is there a community? Does it strengthen their faith? Does it strengthen and improve daily living? Involvement in the local church community should contribute to the mission of the Church. We need to clarify what we mean by the term "practising" Christian. We cannot be practising if we only do the minimum of attending church. We must live as a true follower of Jesus reflecting his values. Labels such as "the good churchgoer" or "unchristian" can damage our understanding and appreciation of true discipleship. Labels such as these tend to indicate judgment on externals rather than the heart. Churchgoing and church living need to be put together. We should not "go" to church; we should "belong" to and live church as the community of disciples of Jesus. The Community which gathers on a Sunday should strengthen the lives of those who share and help them continue their mission. God has to be at the centre of their lives not only at worship but when living day to day.
